HIS family of Powys, with a name which suggests Worcestershire, and was suing for the discovery of certain that its members were Welsh emigrants from Powysland, is first found as burgesses of Ludlow, a Shropshire town on the Herefordshire border ten miles from the marches of Wales. In the nineteenth century the surname persuaded a genealogist to construct for it a pedigree from the princes of Powys, a genealogy which hardly calls for serious attention.

The first ancestor of the house for whose existence the records at our disposal will testify, is William Powys of Ludlow, who was bailiff of Ludlow in 1573. In the court rolls of Ludlow, a manor of the crown, he appears as a juror from 1547 onwards. In 1550 he is presented as having made an affray upon one John Long, and both are fined. The pedigree put forward by his descendants at the Shropshire visitation in 1663 gives the date of his birth as 10 Henry VII. (1494-95), a date which is at least a possible one. He is there said to have been son of James Powys son of John Powys of Meifod in Montgomeryshire, which John was son of Richard and grandson of Thomas Powys, whose mother Emme was living as widow of William Powys in 6 Edw. II. (1312-13). It is impossible to estimate the value of this pedigree, which remains for us a line of names unsupported by documents, and the fewness of the generations reckoned with would alone throw doubt upon its value. The same pedigree asserts that William, the bailiff of Ludlow, was twice married, and that from his first marriage descended a family of Powys of whose existence, at Abingdon in Berkshire, we have evidence. By the alleged second marriage he had five sons and two daughters, the eldest son of the five being Thomas Powys of Snitton in Bitterley, with whom our detailed genealogy begins.

The younger brothers of Thomas Powys were yeomen and gentry of the lesser sort. His brother John Powys, first of Snitton and afterwards of Greet in the parish of Burford, made his will as a yeoman in 1618, giving as a legacy to his three younger children the sum of a hundred pounds, a debt which his brother Thomas of Snitton should have paid him twelve years before. Edward Powys of Ludlow, apparently another brother, made a will in 1630, in which he writes himself gentleman. Isabel, the elder of the two sisters, was wife of Richard Hall of Greet, whom Margaret Powys, a niece who had dwelled with him for two years and more, describes as a plain husbandman who used to hold the plough every day, and sometime a servant in livery to Sir Richard Hopton, whose badge he wore 'upon

the sleave of his blewe cote.'

The beginnings of the advancement of Thomas Powys of Snitton may be seen in his chancery bill of 1583. He had come to London and was servant, barrister's clerk as we should now write it, to Toby Wood, a Lincoln's Inn lawyer. gives him the character of a 'compliant young aspiring By this time he had already acquired a house and lands in lawyer,' and he was able to make his way under a govern-

deeds which had fallen into the hands of the defendants. It is probable that he prospered in some corner of the lawyer's calling in which his marriage would have advanced him, for his wife was the daughter of one Richard Smith, the son of a Herefordshire squire and an officer of the Exchequer. He died in 1639 and was buried at Snitton, where his sons set up a fair monument to their parents with their two shields of arms.

His eldest son, Thomas Powys of Henley in Bitterley, carried the family fortunes further than his father's mark. He was a bencher of Lincoln's Inn and a serjeant-at-law. His first wife was a daughter of Sir Adam Littleton of Stoke 2 Milburgh, chief justice of North Wales, and his second wife was a daughter of the good Shropshire house of Cotes of Milcote, by a Bagot of Blithfield. Of the sons of the second marriage one was a chief clerk of the treasury and another a doctor of the civil law. The children of the first mar-

riage are headed by two notable judges.

Littleton Powys of Henley, heir of Thomas the serjeant. followed his father at Lincoln's Inn. A codicil to his will disinheriting any legatee who should become a papist is characteristic of the man who read the declaration of William of Orange in Shrewsbury, a bold act which assured his career under the protestant monarch, who made him a judge of the Chester circuit in 1689. Three years afterwards he was a knight and serjeant-at-law. In 1700 he became a judge of the King's Bench, from which he administered justice until 1726, when he retired to Henley with a pension of 1,500l. and a character for slow-witted respectability. He died in 173½, leaving a will which shows something of a side of his character which has escaped the judge's biographers. Its preface sums up his public life, relating that he had been second justice of the Chester circuit for seven years, and one of the twelve judges of Westminster Hall for thirty-one years (whereof seven as a baron of the exchequer). For twenty-four years he had been a justice of the king's bench, which office he had surrendered with the continuance of his salary by the grace and favour of King George. In the eighty-fifth year of his age he found himself 'in pretty good health (gout excepted).' Henley Hall he had built a library for his books, 'being choice, numerous and valuable, and of my own collecting, and he had embellished the garden walks with statues. Another evidence of liberal taste is shown in his legacy of twenty guineas to his 'very ingenious, very learned friend Doctor Edmund Halley the astronomer.'

His brother Thomas Powys was ancestor of the Lilford family. A Lincoln's Inn man like his father and brother, he rose to be solicitor-general and a knight in 1686. Burnet

- 1. It is almost certain that Thomas was not the eldest son. The eldest was more likely to have been Edward who remained in Ludlow after his father William's death, inheriting his father's properties.

ment with which he had little sympathy. As attorney- tonshire, and there in the church he was buried in 1719 general he conducted the king's case against the seven bishops with a mildness and moderation which would have been rank treason in the ears of Sir Edward Coke. Such a man could come by no harm at the revolution which his elder brother had aided, and he became a celebrated counsel for state prisoners, Sir John Fenwick being one of his less fortunate clients. From queen's serjeant he was promoted in 1713 to be a judge of the Queen's Bench, but two brothers upon the same bench voting together with fraternal unanimity made a position which the court could not long tolerate, and on the coming of King George, he, as the more active and troublesome Powys, was removed and reinstated in his rank of king's serjeant.

In 1711 he acquired the manor of Lilford in Northamp-

under a monument of grey and white marble, between whose pillars lies the effigy of Sir Thomas in his judge's robe, between statues of those qualities of Religion and Eloquence which advance a man to be attorney-general and judge.

His great-grandson, an active parliament man for more than twenty years, and famous for his frequent speeches, was the first Lord Lilford and ancestor of a numerous family. His descendant, the fourth Lord Lilford who died in 1896, made Lilford celebrated by his aviaries and natural history collections. A yachtsman and a falconer, he followed the study of ornithology from boyhood, and died whilst still engaged upon his great work of the Coloured figures of birds of the British Islands which was completed by the naturalist Osbert Salvin.

Thomas Powys of Snitton in Bitterley in the county of Shropshire, gentleman, was born about 1558, the son of William Powys, bailiff of Ludlow. On 16 Nov. 1639 he made a short will in which his daughter Winifred is the only legatee, administration with the will annexed being granted 17 Dec. 1639 in the consistory court of Hereford to Elizabeth Powys, the relict. He died 16 Nov. 1639 aged 81, as appears by his monument at Bitterley, where he was buried on 20 Nov. following.

He married Elizabeth Smith, daughter of Richard Smith, esquire, of the Exchequer, a second son of Thomas Smith of Credenhill, co. Hereford. She died I July 1643, and was buried at Bitterley, where a monument recites her parentage, and gives the names of her nine children. These children were—

i. s. Thomas Powys of Henley in Bitterley, esquire, of whom hereafter.

ii. s. Christopher Powys, who was admitted to Lincoln's Inn 16 March 164½, as second son of Thomas Powys of Snitton.

iii. s. Peter Powys of Hollings in Shropshire, gentleman, who made a will 12 Oct. 1656, asking for burial 'near my father and mothers mowlde.' He desired his brethren Thomas Powys, esquire, Henry Mytton, esquire, and James Powys, merchant, to have a care for the education of his children, and hoped his brother Thomas would grant the lands which the testator held in Hollings, Thursly, and Bennets End, 'according to his promise on our marriage' to Richard, the testator's son, for his life. The residue of his estate he gave to his wife Joan, his executrix, who proved the will 26 April 1659.¹

His first wife, according to the heralds' pedigree, was Elizabeth Cupper, daughter of William Cupper, and his second, Joan Morris, daughter and heir of John Morris of Rochford, co. Hereford. This Joan made a will . . . as of Rochford, widow, which was proved 30 July 1722 in the consistory court of Hereford by Peter Powys, the son and executor.

Peter Powys of Hollings had issue-

- I s. WILLIAM Powys (son of the first marriage), a citizen and skinner of London. He was apprenticed in 1661 as son of Peter Powys (his father being wrongly described as of Cayham, an error for Cainham where he sometimes dwelt), and had the freedom of his company 4 June 1678. He died without issue. He made a will 31 Jan. 1688, giving his wife Sarah his lands at Little Hereford, called Grubs, which lands, if his said wife died before Sir Thomas Powys, were to remain to his brother John Whitfield of Maidenhead, esquire, until the death of Sir Thomas. He also gave his wife his houses and lands at Upper and Lower Haighton, with remainder to the said John Whitfield. She proved the will as executrix 19 June 1689.²
- 2 s. Richard Powys, of Rochford, co. Hereford, gentleman, is named in his father's will as eldest son of Peter and Joan. He was born 5 Jan. and was christened at Cainham 15 Jan. 165½. He was probably ancestor of a family of Powys living at Rochford after his death.
- 3 s. Peter Powys, who was christened at Cainham 16 June 1653. He is named in his father's will under which he had a legacy of 1201., and he proved his mother's will in 1722.
- 4 s. Thomas Powrs, who was christened at Cainham 8 Aug. 1654. His father gave him a legacy of 1201., out of his lands in Hollings, Bennet's End, Thursley and Hope Bagot.
- iv. s. Robert Powys, named on his mother's monument.
- v. s. James Powys, who was living as a merchant in 1656, when the will of his brother Peter Powys asks him to have a care of the education of the testator's children.
- i. D. Winiffed Powys, who is the only legatee named in her father's will of 1639, by which she had his lands in Ashford Carbonell and Huntington, then or late in the possession of the testator or of Jane Cupper, deceased, with 100l. towards her preferment in marriage. She is said to have married Ambrose Rudge of Tresall, co. Stafford.
- ii. D. Anne Powys, who is said to have married William Wall of Hereford.
- iii. D. Mary Powys, who is said to have been married in 1651 to John Marston of Astcote, co. Salop.
- iv. d. Elizabeth Powys, youngest daughter of Thomas Powys and Elizabeth Smith, was born 11 Jan.
 163°, as appears by her monument. She was first married to Richard Hunt of Milson, co.
 Salop, by whom she had issue an only daughter Elizabeth, who was born 24 Dec. 1654 and died
 7 Dec. 1727° at Shipton. She was married before 12 Oct. 1656 to Henry Mytton of Shipton,

esquire (son of Henry Mytton, lord of the manor of Shipton), who is then named in her brother Peter's will. He was born 25 Sept. 1626, and died 27 May 1688, leaving issue by her Henry Edward, Thomas, Mary and Anne. She died 9 April 1716, and was buried at Shipton by her second husband, her monument describing her as sister of Thomas Powys the serjeant-at-law, and aunt to the two justices of the Queen's Bench. The Mytton arms—party sable and gules with a two-headed eagle silver and a border engrailed gold—are parted with those of Powys.

Thomas Powrs of Henley in Bitterley, esquire, son and heir of Thomas Powys of Snitton by Elizabeth Smith, was born in 1617. He matriculated at Oxford 14 Nov. 1634, and was admitted 11 Jan. $163\frac{7}{8}$ as a student of Lincoln's Inn, where he became a bencher. He was a serjeant-at-law, and dying 21 April 1671, was buried 23 April at Bitterley, where he has a monument. He made a will 19 June 1668, wherein he ordered that none of his lands in Bitterley or Staunton Lacy (except the Nowberie Farm) should go to the children of his second wife Mary, nor any of his lands in Cainham or Hollings, Thursley or Hardwick, or the Nowberie Farm to the children of his first wife Anne. He recited an indenture of 12 Sept. 1655 made between himself and John Walcott of Walcott, esquire, Samuel Powell of Stannage, co. Radnor, esquire, and Edward Littleton, then of All Souls' College, esquire, whereby he had power to limit a sum of 2,000l., of which he devised 500l. each to his sons Thomas and John, and 1000l. to his daughter Anne. He gave to John Cotes of Woodcote, esquire, and Robert Clarke of Buckby, Northants, esquire, an annuity of 200l. out of his lands in Rock and Staunton Lacy, in the possession of Thomas Bishopp, Joseph Powys and others, towards the maintenance of his five children by his wife Mary, for whose education he also settled the manor of Cainham with the Nowberie Farm and messuages and lands in Hollings, Thursley, Hope Bagot and Hardwick, Robert Powys, the eldest of the sons, having the reversion of Cainham manor. A codicil of 19 June 1668 records the death of the testator's son Edward Powys, and the will was proved 26 Nov. 1672^5 by Littleton Powys the son, power being reserved to Thomas THOMAS POWYS of Henley in Bitterley, esquire, son and heir of Thomas Powys of Snitton by Elizabeth Smith, was ward Powys, and the will was proved 26 Nov. 1672 by Littleton Powys the son, power being reserved to Thomas Powys the son, another executor.

Thomas Powys was first married to Anne Littleton, daughter of Sir Adam Littleton of Stoke Milburgh, co. Salop, baronet, chief justice of North Wales. She died 30 June 1655 aged 33, and was buried at Bitterley.

His second wife was Mary Cotes, daughter of John Cotes of Woodcote, co. Salop, esquire (who died 13 Oct. 1643, and was buried at Woodcote, where he had a monument) by Mary, daughter of Walter Bagot of Blithfield. She died 7 June 1668 aged 36, and was buried 8 June at Bitterley.

By his first wife Thomas Powys of Henley had issue four sons and two daughters-

i. s. Sir Littleton Powrs of Henley in Bitterley, knight, who was christened 27 April 1647 at Bitterley. Admitted 12 May 1664 as a student of Lincoln's Inn, he was a baron of the Exchequer 1695; a judge of the Common Pleas 1697; and a judge of the King's Bench 26 Jan. 170°, which office he resigned in 1726. He died 13 March 173½, without surviving issue, and was buried at Bitterley 28 March.

He married Agnes Carter, niece of John Carter, citizen and grocer of London, who consents to the marriage in the allegation for the marriage licence dated 2 Dec. 1674,9 she being then a spinster, aged about 18, of St. Dunstan's in the West. She died 28 Nov. 1720 aged 66, and was buried at Bitterley II Dec. Her arms upon her monument are azure a lion passant between three round buckles gold.

Sir Littleton Powys had issue by his wife Agnes Carter two daughters, Elizabeth and Anne, who were both buried at Bitterley 31 Dec. 1720.

- ii. s. SIR THOMAS POWYS of Lilford, Northants, knight, of whom hereafter.
- iii. s. Edward Powys, who was educated at Shrewsbury School and matriculated at Oxford (Trinity College) 14 Dec. 1666, being then aged 15. He died in 1668 aged 18, and was buried in the church of St. Mary Magdalene in Oxford, as appears by a monument there.
- iv. s. John Powys, who is named in his father's will, under which he had a legacy of 500l. He is said to have been a clerk in holy orders, and to have died on a voyage to the West Indies.
- i. D. Anne Powys, who is named in her mother's monumental inscription as having died in infancy.
- ii. D. Anne Powrs, who was wife of Andrew Hill of Court of Hill in Burford, co. Salop, esquire, who died
 23 Aug. 1708 aged 49 years and 8 months. He was buried at Burford. She died 19 Sept.
 1725 aged 71, and was buried at Burford, having issue by her husband. Her monument, which
 describes her as daughter of Thomas Powys of Henley by Anne Littleton, was set up by her son-in-law William Read, vicar of Tenbury.

By his second wife Thomas Powys of Henley had issue five sons and one daughter.

- v. s. William Powys, who was christened 23 Sept. 1660 at Bitterley, where he was buried 7 Feb. 1669.
- vi. s. Robert Powys of Ludlow, who was christened 6 Oct. 1661 at Bitterley. He matriculated 5 July 1680 at Oxford (Balliol College). He died unmarried 18 April 1724, and was buried 30 April at Bitterley, 11 administration of his goods being granted 5 June 1724 12 to Charles Cotes, esquire, and Andrew Hill, guardians of Richard Powys the nephew, a minor.
- vii. s. Richard Powrs of the parish of St. Anne's, Westminster, esquire, who was born at Bitterley and christened there 15 Dec. 1662. He was chief clerk of the treasury. He died 18 Feb. 172\frac{1}{4}, and was buried at Hintlesham. His will, dated 9 May 1723, was proved 18 Feb. 172\frac{1}{4} by

Thomas Hill alias Harwood, esquire, and Andrew Hill, gent., two of the executors, power being reserved etc. to Charles Cotes, esquire. He described himself in this will as of St. Anne's, Westminster, and directed that he should be buried at Hintlesham. He gave his Suffolk lands in trust for his son Richard Powys, and to the same trustees he gave a farm which he had bought at Cainham, co. Salop, in a like trust.

He married Elizabeth Singleton, daughter of John Singleton, a citizen and dyer of London, which John died 12 Dec. 1700. Richard Powys with his wife Elizabeth and Charles, Mary and Anne Singleton, her brother and sisters (then minors), filed a bill in chancery 14 July 1701 concerning the will dated 2 April 1688 of John Fisher of St. Mary Aldermary, gent., the father of their mother Elizabeth the first wife of John Singleton (son of John Singleton) whose relict and administratrix was his second wife Anne Howson, daughter of William Howson, a London citizen. Labeth Powys died before her husband, and was haved at Histopham as appears by her hysband? will was buried at Hintlesham, as appears by her husband's will.

Richard Powys and Anne Singleton had issue a son and a daughter-

I s. Richard Powys of Hintlesham Hall, co. Suffolk, esquire. He was M.P. for Orford from 1734 to 1741. His will, dated 21 July 1742, with a codi-cil undated and a second dated 13 July 1743, was proved 12 Sept. 1742¹³ by the relict and executrix.

His wife was, as his will recites, Lady Mary Brudenell, youngest daughter of George Brudenell, third Earl of Cardigan, and sister of the Duke of Montague, who was married to him 30 May 1735. After his death she married, in 1754, Thomas Bowlby of Denham, esquire, who was comptroller of army accounts, which office he exchanged on 20 July 1767 for that of commissary general of musters. In 1767 Thomas Bowlby was returned member for Launceston, a borough of the Duke of Northumberland's, and he died at Jenningsbury in Herts. in 1795. She survived him, and died in London 21 Feb. 1813, in her 97th year.

Richard Powys and Lady Mary Brudenell had issue two daughters and co-heirs-

> i D. ELIZABETH Powys, born 7 April 1736, and married 19 May 1760, at St. George's, Hanover Square, to Thomas Townshend, Viscount Sydney. She died at Chapel Street, Mayfair, 1 May 1826, aged 90.

> ii D. Mary Powys, who was married 16 April 1762 to
> James Stopford, Earl of Courtown, by whom she
> left issue. She died at Ham Common 3 Jan.
> 1810. and was buried at Deane, Northants. Her 1810, and was buried at Deane, Northants. Her husband, who was born 28 May 1731, died 30 March 1810.

I D. Anne Powys, only daughter. She was married at St. Anne's, Soho, 14 Feb. 1723, to Thomas Harwood of Tean, co. Salop, who had taken the name of Hill. She died 21 Dec. 1739.

viii. s. Henry Powys, who matriculated 7 March 168 at Oxford (Merton College), being then aged 18. He was B.C.L. from All Souls' College in 1692, and D.C.L. in 1697.

ix. s. George Powys, who was christened 8 June 1668 at Bitterley, his mother dying in giving birth to

iii. D. MARY Powys, only daughter of Thomas Powys of Henley by his second marriage. She was christened 10 Jan. 1663 at Bitterley and dying in 1668 was buried at Teddington. 16

Sir Thomas Powrs of Lilford in Northamptonship, knight, second son of Thomas Powys of Henley, was born at Bitterley and christened there 7 Feb. 164\(\frac{8}{6}\). He matriculated at Oxford (Queen's College) 20 May 1664, and was admitted 19 Feb. 166\(\frac{5}{6}\) as a student of Lincoln's Inn. He was solicitor-general in 1686, attorney-general in 1697, and premier serjeant-at-law in 1702. In 1713 he was made a judge of the Queen's Bench. In 1711 he bought the manor of Lilford, where his descendants are still seated. He died 4 April 1719, and was buried 12 April in the parish church of Lilford.\(^{17}\) His will, made 29 Sept. 1718, recites that he had made a settlement of his manors and lands in Salop and Northants on the marriage of his eldest son Thomas Powys. He named his sons Thomas, Ambrose and Philip, and his brothers Sir Littleton and Richard Powys. of Mollington, co. Warwick, esquire. The allegation for the marriage licence is dated 4 June 1685, 19 she being then aged about 19. She died in March 1694, and was buried in the church of St. Alban's in Wood Street.

The second wife was Elizabeth Meadows, daughter of Sir Philip Meadows of Bentley Hall in Suffolk, knight, the allegation for the marriage licence being dated I Oct. 1698,20 when she was aged about 30. She survived her

- iii. s. Ambrose Powys of Lincoln's Inn, esquire. He matriculated at Oxford (Queen's College) 3 June 1708, being then aged 16, and was admitted as a student of Lincoln's Inn 17 Feb. 17½%, his father having left him his study of books at Serjeants' Inn, on condition that he should apply himself to the law. He died unmarried 28 Jan. 1753 and was buried 4 Feb. at Lilford. Administration of his goods was granted 14 Feb. 1753 22 to Jane Powys, spinster, the sister and next
- i. D. SARAH POWYS, the first wife of Thomas Carthew of Benacre, co. Suffolk, by whom she had issue.

 With her husband and children she is named in her father's will of 1718. She was dead before the making of the will of her uncle Sir Littleton Powys.
- ii. D. Anne Powys, who was a legatee under the wills of her father Sir Thomas and of her uncle Sir
- Littleton Powys. She died 22 May 1747 aged 56, and was buried 28 May at Lilford.

 iii. D. Jane Powys, who was administratrix in 1753 of the goods of her brother Ambrose Powys, she being then a spinster. She was a legatee of her father and of her uncle Sir Littleton Powys.

By his second wife, Elizabeth Meadows, Sir Thomas Powys had issue two sons-

- iv. s. Philip Powys, who died an infant.
- v. s. Philip Powys of Hardwick, co. Oxford, esquire, was left by his father in the guardianship of his uncle Sir Philip Meadows. He matriculated 15 July 1721 at Oxford (Queen's College), having been admitted 1 June 1719 as a student of Lincoln's Inn. His father settled upon him the inheritance of his house in Lincoln's Inn Fields, which was worth more than 3,000l. He died in 1779, and was buried I Sept. 1779 at Hardwick.

He married at St. Benet's, Paul's wharf, 19 Dec. 1730, Isabella Lybbe, daughter and heir of Richard Lybbe of Hardwick, by whom he had issue. IV

Thomas Powys of Lilford in Northamptonshire, esquire, son and heir of Sir Thomas Powys, knight, was born about 1687. He matriculated 8 Nov. 1703 at Oxford (Christ Church), and was admitted 12 July 1709 as a student of Lincoln's Inn. He died 3 March 17½% aged 32, and was buried 9 March at Lilford, where his monument remains. He made a will 27 Feb. 17½%, which was proved 14 March 17½% 32 by John Davies, D.D., and Ambrose Powys the brother. He asked to be buried at Lilford at the feet of his father under a plain stone with only his name upon it.

He married, as appears by their monument at Lilford, Catherine Ravenscroft, daughter and co-heir of Thomas Ravenscroft of Broadlane in Flint, esquire, the marriage being celebrated 28 April 1718 at St. Anne's, Soho. Her husband's will recites her settlement upon him of lands in Wales, and speaks of her debt for the burial of her sister Mrs. Conway. She died 8 Sept. 1721, and was buried 15 Sept. at Lilford.

Thomas Powys and Catherine Ravenscroft had issue an only son-

Thomas Powys of Lilford, esquire, only son of Thomas Powys and Catherine Ravenscroft, was born 24 Sept. 1719, and matriculated 27 July 1736 at Oxford (University College). He died 2 April 1767, and was buried 10 April in the vault at Lilford. He made a will 31 Dec. 1765, which was proved 15 April 1767 24 by William Holbech of Farnborough, co. Warwick, esquire, the executor. He asked that a tombstone might be set over him giving the date of his birth and death, and describing him as grandson of Sir Thomas Powys.

He married, 18 Nov. 1740, Henrietta Spence, daughter of Thomas Spence of Saville Row, serjeant of the House of Commons. She died in 1771, having lived apart from her husband for some years before his death. In her will, dated II April 1770, she describes herself as of Wigmore Street, Cavendish Square. She desired to be buried in the vault under the communion table of St. Paul's, Covent Garden. She gave to her son Thomas Powys a brilliant diamond ring, and a seal with the arms of Powys and Spence upon a topaz, together with the picture of her father Thomas Spence in enamel set in gold, and the Duchess of Newcastle's picture 'painted by Lens in her hair and dressed picturesque,' also set in gold, and she named her late aunt Spence and late uncle Robert Spence. This will was proved 31 May 1771 25 by Thomas Read, the executor.

Thomas Powys and Henrietta Spence had issue two sons and two daughters-

He was member for Northamptonshire from 1774 to 1797, distinguishing himself by his oratory and was created, on 26 Oct. 1797, Lord Lilford of Lilford, co. Northampton. His will, dated 15 Feb. 1798, was proved 12 April 1800 26 by Thomas Powys, the second Lord Lilford, power being reserved etc. to the dowager Lady Lilford.

He married, 31 March 1772, Mary Mann, daughter of Galfridus Mann of Boughton Malherbe, co. Kent, by Sarah, daughter of John Gregory of London. She died at Clifton in Jan. 1823.

He married at Godstone, 24 July 1809, Penelope Hatsell, daughter of James Hatsell of Spring Garden Terrace and of Marden Park in Surrey, formerly a tradesman in the Strand, which James Hatsell died at Marden Park 2 Sept. 1812 in his 73rd year. She, who was niece of John Hatsell, clerk of the House of Commons, died 22 Nov. 1864.

B.A. Oxford (St. Edmund Hall) 1801, M.A. 1807, and D.D. 1839. From 1848 he was an honorary canon of Worcester, and from 1860 rector of Beddington in Surrey, where he died 24 Aug. 1864. He was a well-known divine of the evangelical school, and was surnamed 'Millennial Marsh' from the constant subject of his sermons. The arms of the house of Powrs, Lords Lilford, are gold a lion's paw razed gules lying bendwise between two crosslets fitchy gules, and their crest is a lion's paw erect gules holding a sceptre gold with a fleur de lys at the head. The supporters of the shield are a reaper with a sheaf of corn at his feet, and a trooper in the old uniform of the Northamptonshire yeomanry.



ELIZABETH SMITH, wife of Thomas Powys of Snitton (I.), was daughter of Richard Smith, of the Smiths of Credenhill, who bore arms silver a lion standing on a green mount and looking backwards.



MARY MANN, wife of Thomas, the first Lord Lilford (VI.), was daughter of Galfridus Mann of Boughton Malherbe, who bore arms of sable a fesse battled on both sides silver between three silver goats with three roundels sable on the fesse.



Anne Littleton, first wife of Thomas Powys of Henley (II.), was daughter of Sir Adam Littleton of Stoke Milburgh, who bore arms of silver a cheveron sable between three scallops sable differenced with a molet on the cheveron.



Anna Maria Atherton, wife of Thomas, the second Lord Lilford (VII.), was eldest daughter and co-heir of Robert Vernon Atherton of Atherton Hall, who bore arms of gules three sparrowhawks silver with golden bells and jesses.



SARAH HOLBECHE, first wife of Sir Thomas Powys of Lilford (III.), was daughter of Ambrose Holbeche of Mollington, who bore for arms vert six scallops silver.



MARY ELIZABETH Fox, wife of Thomas Atherton, the third Lord Lilford (VIII.), was daughter of Henry Richard, Lord Holland, who bore arms of ermine a cheveron azure with three foxes' heads razed gold thereon and a quarter azure with a fleur de lis gold.



CATHERINE RAVENSCROFT, wife of Thomas Powys (IV.), was daughter and co-heir of Thomas Ravenscroft of Broadlane, who bore arms of silver a cheveron sable and three ravens' heads razed.



EMMA ELIZABETH BRANDLING, wife of Thomas Littleton, the fourth Lord Lilford (IX.), was daughter of William Brandling of Low Gosforth, who bore arms of gules a cross paty silver and a scallop silver in the chief.



MILLY LOUISA ISABELLA SOLTAU-SYMONS, wife of John, the fifth Lord Lilford (X.), is daughter of George William Culme Soltau-Symons who bears arms of six pieces gules and silver, the thwart line indented, with three trefoils silver in the gules.
